## A Word From Our Rabbi

### SIDDUR UPDATE

Shalom. What would you like to hear first—the good news or the bad news? I'll start with the bad news—the new Shabbat Siddur, *Tefillah l'Moshe*, was delayed in getting to the printer, which means it might not be in our hands on New Years Day 2009, as we had originally hoped.

Now the good news—the new siddur is going to be spectacular, from the cover photo of our own Aron Kodesh to the last user friendly comment. Cantor Berris and I, together with our publisher, Joe Lewis, and members of the congregation, have worked long hours on making this siddur exactly what we want for our synagogue.

We have proofread every letter of every word, including: the Hebrew text, the transliteration, translation and comments, and with each proofreading session, we have made further improvements and eliminated errors (of course, we won't catch them all).

The extra care and time that we devote to this project assures that:

1. *Siddur Tefillah l'Moshe* will be arranged according to our B'nai Moshe "way of doing things," so that it will be easy to find such features as the Psalm for Shabbat and *An'im Zemirot*.
2. There will be clearly written explanations of when to sit or stand, when and how to respond to the Cantor, and when to include or omit sections, depending on the time of year.
3. Every text is checked carefully for both content and meaning, including new versions of the prayers for the U.S. and Israel, a passage in memory of the Shoah, and a re-writing of the *yekum purkan* paragraphs into a unified whole.
4. The English translation, based on Joe Lewis' effort, will be readable, "prayable," poetic, ring true to the meaning of the Hebrew, and reflect a healthy balance of tradition and modernity.

The slight delay in this project resulted in another positive outcome—a few members were able to "sneak" into the dedication page by making a late contribution prior to our going to print.

*Siddur Tefillah l'Moshe* continues to be one of the most exciting, innovative and unifying projects in the history of our synagogue. We will keep you up to date on its progress, at the High Holiday services and in future issues of the bulletin.

## A Word From Our Cantor

### IS ONE REQUIRED TO STAND DURING KADDISH

I often get questions about different aspects of the choreography of the service. One of these recently was, "Cantor, I see that some people stand for kaddish in the shul and others don't. Without going into the old joke that concludes – yes, that's



our tradition, I will try and answer the question. This is actually one that was discussed by the rabbi and me as we made some decisions for our new siddur.

The Rama (Rabbi Moshe Isserles, Poland, 1525-1572), in his glosses to the Shulchan Aruch (56, Halacha 1), writes that it is proper to stand during the recitation of Kaddish, and this is indeed the practice of the Ashkenazim, to remain standing throughout the entire recitation of every Kaddish. This ruling evolves from a comment in the Talmud Yerushalmi concerning the story recorded in Sefer Shoftim (chapter 3) of the judge Ehud Ben Gera. Ehud visited Eglon, king of Moav, and said to him, "I have for you a word from God" (Shoftim 3:20), at which point Eglon immediately rose from his chair. The Yerushalmi derives from this incident that it is proper to stand upon hearing the Name of God. Accordingly, the Ashkenazim make a point of standing during the recitation of Kaddish, when we give praise to the Name of God ("Yehei Shemei Rabba Mevarach...").

Most Chassidic sects follow Ashkenazic tradition for this custom having come from Europe, even though in most cases their practice is much closer to Sephardic Jews.

The Arizal, however, followed a different practice, standing during Kaddish only if he had been standing previously. The custom of the Sepharadim, is to remain standing if one had been standing before Kaddish, and to remain seated if one had been sitting before Kaddish, as practiced by the Arizal. But, unlike the Ashkenazim, who remain standing throughout the entirety of Kaddish, Sepharadim stand (when they had been standing before Kaddish) only through the response of "Yehei Shemei Rabba..." (until "Da'amiran Be'alma"). (Halacha Berura, Helek 4, page 205)

The Rabbi and I have decided that in the new siddur, "Tefillah l'Moshe" the direction for Kaddish will follow the practice of the Arizal, which standardizes the practice as the majority of our congregation already follows. If we are already standing, we will remain standing for all of the Kaddish, if we have been sitting, we will remain seated.



# L.I.F.E. / Youth News





## IT'S TIME TO JOIN THE FRIENDS OF THE B'NAI MOSHE LIBRARY

As we enter the month of October we are in the midst of the Jewish New Year holiday cycle as we finish the two days of Rosh Hashanah, prepare for Yom Kippur and then celebrate the joyous week of Sukkot. But the Jewish New Year of 5769 is not the only "new year" that has started recently. On July 1<sup>st</sup> we started the new "Synagogue Year" and that means it is a new year for the **Friends of the B'nai Moshe Library** too. **It is time to renew your membership, or join the Friends for the first time** to support the ongoing activities of the Library.

In August everyone should have received the Friends' flyer announcing the start of "Holds from Home". Last year the Library made the catalog available on your home computers so you could easily find out if the library owned the book or material on a subject that you need. The logical next step in providing the best and most convenient library service for everyone is to make it possible for you to request that book or material from the library over your home computer. This is what the "Holds from Home" process is all about. You place the Hold; the volunteer librarian is notified of the Hold by the InfoCentre computer system at the Library and fills the request when the item is available. You are notified via email when the material is ready for pickup.
